## Softball, Ping Pong Begin Next Week

More summer activities have been scheduled for next week, according to SG Vice-president Becky Waller, summer social director.

BEGINNING MONDAY EVENING, mixed softball games are planned. There must be at least ten and no more than fifteen people on each team. At least four of the players, including the pitcher, must be girls, and all the boys must bat on the opposite side of the plate than normal.

## Physicians' Association Donates Scholarships

The Northwest Tennessee Academy of Medicine, an association of physicians representing the counties of Dyer, Lake, Lauderdale, and Obion, has contributed two \$500 nursing scholarships to UTM.

They are part of the "Pacemaker 70" campaign to raise the University's scholarship funds to \$75,000. Dr. Robert Clendinin of Union City, president of the organization and Pacemaker committeeman, has announced.

TO BE AWARDED during the 1970-71 academic year, preference will be given to scholarship applicants who are currently employed as practical nurses. The recipient of the scholarships must reside in the four-county area of Dyer, Lake, Lauderdale, and Obion.

According to F. G. Cavin, Jr. of Union City, chairman of the Pacemaker campaign, more than \$25,481 in new scholarships, awards and increases in existing scholarships and \$59,865 in pledges have been received as part of the campaign.

## UTM Joins Collegiate Association

Affiliation of this campus with the American Association of State Colleges and Universities has been announced by Chancellor Archie R. Dykes.

THE ORGANIZATION has 271 member institutions that reach across the territories of Guam and the Virgin Islands. They represent the fastest growing group of degree granting institutions in the nation. Their enrollments tripled in the last decade as they broadened course offerings and responded to the need for greater availability of low-cost, high quality education. One of each five college students comes from a member institution.

Last year they awarded one-fourth of the nation's bachelor degrees, and one-fifth of the master's degrees, and graduated 46 percent of the country's potential teachers.

"MEMBERSHIP IN THIS higher educational association should prove helpful to The University of Tennessee at Martin since the goals and purposes we have set for our institution are the same as those of the organization," Chancellor Dykes said.

Overall services offered by the association include helping to expand curricula and programs, increasing understanding of the expanding role and responsibilities of state colleges and universities and presenting information to congressional committees considering legislation which affects state colleges and universities. It represents the interests of members with federal departments and agencies, other education organizations, and groups outside education.

The association assists in conducting national and regional workshops to help member institutions deal with specific problems and develop new programs. It helps initiate projects to strengthen contributions to the nation and to establish International study centers for students and faculty members of participating institutions.

## EPS Completion A Year Away

Work is now being done on the addition to the EPS Building by Scudder and Company of Union City with a projected completion date of June 21, 1971.

Designed primarily to house the recently implemented four-year program in engineering technology, the 52,462 square feet of construction will more than double the size of the present structure.

Facilities to be added include 19 laboratories, eight classrooms, and 27 offices.

Incoming and upperclassmen, the campaign was conceived by the UTM Development Committee with hopes of providing scholarship funds for financially hard-pressed students and to promote scholastic achievement through merit awards.

Although UTM, for the past several years the fastest growing institution of higher learning in the state, is a state-aided university, many of its needs, including scholarships, cannot be met from funds derived from taxes. Growing enrollments have intensified the need for more private support in the form of "extras" which make for a continued excellence.

IT IS ANTICIPATED that privately donated gifts will enable the University to provide assistance to more students during the 1970-71 academic year than those who received scholarships during the past year.

### Braniff Airlines Offers Youth Fare

Braniff International Airlines will offer youth standby fares on its mainland-Hawaii flight for the first time beginning July 8 and will provide qualified young people a savings of up to 31 percent, the airline announced recently.

Under the plan, youth between the ages of 12 and 22 will be able to take advantage of Braniff's confirmed-space-youth fare from Nashville to Dallas, Fort Worth, or Atlanta, then travel on a standby basis to Hawaii or any of the islands at a 31 percent reduction off regular coach fares.

TO QUALIFY, W.K. Schriener, the Airlines district sales director in Nashville, said young travelers must present a valid youth identification card at the time they purchase the tickets and carry the card with them during their trip. The cards are available from any Braniff ticket office for \$3, and youth cards issued by other airlines will be accepted.
